



STRANGE ASSAILANTS STALK CEMETERY

Arkham Labor Day Parade Draws Crowds' Ire

Monday's Labor Day parade and celebration in Arkham's Independence Square proved to be quite the spectacle with an estimated 2,000 Arkhamites attending the morning parade as well as the festival and concert performed throughout the afternoon and evening. However, not every Arkham citizen exudes a festive spirit, as several individuals loudly picketed throughout the event.

Mayor Charlie Kane kicked off Arkham's Labor Day celebration at the head of Monday's parade, which featured the Miskatonic University marching band, many floats from area businesses and charities, and several of the Arkham Fire Department's fire engines, including the new hook-and-ladder truck purchased this past spring. Area children thrilled as firefighters threw saltwater taffy from the sides of the truck, providing attendees a tasty treat.

Upon arriving at the parade's culmination at Independence Square, Arkhamites were treated to all manner of festival foods, games of chance and rides provided by Darke's Carnival, and performances from several area musicians. Festivities went on through the afternoon, ending with a fireworks finale at 9p.m. that evening.

However, the Labor Day festivities were marred by the appearance of several picketers loudly protesting the celebrations. —Cont'd on page 2

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Beasts Abroad? Unholy Activity

While Arkham's cemeteries typically provide a place of quiet calm and contemplation for Arkham's residents, recent incidents have begun to call security for parishioners, visitors, and employees into question. On the night of September 6, this reporter set out to investigate rumors of after-hours trespassers on cemetery grounds. However, after a harrowing encounter and subsequent assault, this reporter has confirmed that danger actually stalks those hallowed grounds, though its true cause remains unknown.

In the past, Arkham's cemeteries have proven to be a place of potential peril. Most notably, a nun was assaulted by one Mr. Henri Dupont this past August in South Church churchyard. While Sister Mary did recover from her injuries, the case garnered particular notoriety due to her status within the Catholic community. Other alarming reports indicate that the graveyards in Arkham have not been safe. Due to these

recent reports, this reporter initiated a new investigation starting at Christchurch Cemetery, which revealed strange going-ons dating back to ear-lier this year. On March 20, Arkham police deputies responded to a call for assistance put forward by a Ms. Hattie Naismith, who had claimed to see figures moving through the cemetery at night, as well as strange sounds emanating from the mausoleum in the northwest quarter of the cemetery. Arkham's official police report states that the incident was a result of animal interference, noting evidence of digging, implying that a large dog or similar animal had attempted to dig underneath the wrought-iron fencing.


Another distressing incident occurred on April 11, with Mr. James Gantree and Ms. Eliza Mantilluz calling for police, after having been accosted by a figure outside of Christchurch Cemetery earlier that evening. The pair were returning to Ms. Mantilluz's apartment following a late dinner out, and the duo had elected to cross through the cemetery grounds to save time. As the pair exited the graveyard, Mr. Gantree claimed to have spotted a "hunched figure

with long, lanky arms" who began staring at them from behind a copse of trees. When Mr. Gantree called out to the individual, Gantree claimed the figure "started growling" and appeared to attempt a reply, though Gantree stated that the voice was too low and bestial to hear a clear response. Gantree attempted to get closer to the figure, only for it to dash away to points unknown. At Ms. Mantilluz's insistence, the pair contacted Arkham police and filed an official report. After a brief search of the cemetery grounds, the deputy on duty noted no unusual activity. While a follow-up visit was scheduled by Arkham police, no evidence exists to document such a visit.

Police records showed similar incidents—noise disturbances, aggravated menacing by unknown parties, and minor property damage to Christchurch's grounds throughout the late spring and summer. However, Arkham's police deputies have displayed an alarmingly lackadaisical approach in investigating any sort of disturbance at Christchurch Cemetery. -Holding homemade signs reading slogans such as "Labor Day-Commie Holiday!" and "No Rest! No Peace! No Contracts!" these protesters loudly argued with anyone who dared approach their chosen positions along the south side of Independence Square. Arkham police deputies were dispatched to keep protestors away from the general populace, though no violence was reported.

Mayor Kane commented on the Labor Day festivities, claiming them to be an "unmitigated success" despite the picketers and that, "These celebrations cut to the heart of what it means to be from Arkham: hardworking, diligent, honorable, and vigilant. The workers of Arkham are the workers of wonders."

When asked about the protestors, however, Mayor Kane provided no comment beyond, "That's their right, and they were peaceful as they exercised it. That's all anyone could ask for.'

Labor Day festivities are surely in the works for next year, though city planners are likely busy planning for Arkham's first annual Harvest Festival, currently scheduled for October 22 through 30.



THROB'S FUNERAL CAUSES CHICAGO CHAOS

Even after his untimely demise last month, Rudolph Valentino still managed to turn heads and garner attention. The star of numerous Hollywood films and controversial symbol of masculinity has been on a posthumous tour across the United States, with stops at numerous major cities. However, even after his death, Valentino continued to cause onlookers to swoon

with delight. Arriving in Chicago after having set forth from New York last week, fans of Valentino caused a significant disruption at Chicago's LaSalle Street Station, resulting in a massive police cordon to block off access to the train. Several fans managed to breach the police barricade, finding their way onto the train to presumably pay their respects. Numerous grieving fans even threw themselves onto the train tracks, resulting in at least four arrests as police attempted to keep the station clear. Following the arrests, only a select group of fans were permitted into Mr. Valentino's moving wake, paying their respects as they saw fit.

Valentino's funerary train had caused all manner of chaos even since setting forth from Manhattan. Police estimate that nearly 100,000 fans and well-wishers, some whose exuberance border on cult-like mannerisms, had attempted to pay their respects to the actor, with over 150 police officers and police reservists called up to ensure order. Even with the police presence, eyewitnesses report several Fascist operatives having infil-

trated the event, specifically to defame the Italian lothario.


Born in 1895, Valentino rose to fame in 1919, starring in "The Delicious Little Devil" opposite the consummate Mae Murray. In 1921, Valentino achieved the heights of his stardom, starring in "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse", under the direction of Mr. Rex Ingram. "The Four Horsemen" became one of the first films to pass the seven-figure mark at the box office, becoming an international sensation and drawing ' admiration from around the world

Last month, Mr. Valentino was found unconscious in his room at the Hotel Ambassador in Manhattan, whereupon he was admitted to the hospital and treated for acute appendicitis. However, his condition began to deteriorate quickly, and he fell into a coma from which he would never wake. Posthumous medical examination determined that sepsis had set in at the incision site of his surgery, leading to the infection that

would cause his death. Unfortunately, Valentino was unable to see the release of his final film, "The Son of the Sheik", set to release this week in New York, Los Angeles, and Chicago. Anticipated to launch into a wider release soon after, tickets for Valentino's final film are already on sale at Arkham's Palace Movie Theater, with both matinee and evening showings. For those looking for live entertainment, Betsy Baxter and Tom Sweets are on tour in New England for the month.

-boilerplate response, stating that: "deputy patrolled the area in question, finding no evidence of continued disturbances." These documents were identical, regardless of the responding deputy, leading this reporter to believe that the response was a measured, chosen response by administration, rather than an organic

reporting of the facts.
Given these findings, this reporter began her own investigation of the Christchurch Cemetery. A planned interview with William Yorick, Christchurch Cemetery's resident gravedigger, to discuss disturbances in the cemetery ended abruptly when this reporter caught sight of a mysterious figure - no doubt the person terrorizing the cemetery grounds. After chasing this mysterious figure, this reporter noticed new figures digging frantically in the graveyard, which aligns with previous reports. However, before investigating further,

this reporter experienced a

blow to the head, losing consciousness.

Thanks to the beneficence of Mr. Yorick, this reporter was discovered in an empty grave and was escorted to St. Mary's Hospital for treatment and observation. Following initial triage, this reporter was quickly released from St. Mary's hospital, having suffered a scalp laceration, a possible concussion, and blood loss. While this reporter did file a police report with Arkham's deputies, no action appears to have been taken regarding this assault. Mr. Yorick has given no official statement, at this time.

While this reporter has yet to return to Christchurch Cemetery following these incidents, investigation into these strange occurrences will continue until answers are revealed and perpetrators are brought to light. Until then, however, this reporter recommends avoiding Christchurch Cemetery by night and taking alternate routes when available.

MISSING BODIES VEX ARKHAM'S MORGUE

Condé Diamond Stolen— French Authorities Stymied

French authorities reported a notable theft two days prior as the Condé Diamond—a near Aawless 9-carat rose diamond —was found missing from its home museum in Chantilly, France. Worth an incalculable amount of money, the pear-shaped stone's theft immediately set off a manhunt across central France, with investigators failing to find any real leads. Rumors swirl around the potential involvement of "The Magpie," a noted and elusive jewel thief whose true identity still remains a mystery. Chantilly chief of police Jean-Jacques Barbier commented at length on the theft, noting that the thief's planning of the crime was calculated and impeccable. Under cover of darkness, Barbier surmised, "a single individual scaled the outer walls of the -Cont'd on page 2





Cadaver Calamity Mortuary Mistake

As Arkham police continue to investigate disappearances across our city, a wholly different institution finds itself facing an eerily similar problem. Over the course of the past weeks, a truly disturbing number of corpses have vanished from the morgue at St. Mary's Hospital, raising all manner of questions, with few answers provided by hospital administrators

The Arkham Advertiser first became aware of missing cadavers following an anonymous tip, directing this reporter to one Mr. Harold Silva, a long time Arkham resident whose wife, Mabel, died of natural causes earlier this summer. Before Mabel Silva's burial, Mr. Silva says he was contacted by someone claiming to be a member of staff at St. Mary's Hospital, asking Harold's permission for a full autopsy of Mabel's corpse. Eager for a clearer indication on his wife's cause of death, Mr. Silva agreed to the examination. However, after nearly two weeks, Silva had yet to hear any wor back from

St. Mary's. Since then, Silva has inquired thirteen times regarding the autopsy results and the whereabouts of his wife's body—nine phone calls, two letters, and two in-person visits to the hospital's administration wing. In all cases, his attempts at communication were rebuffed: phone calls were either transferred between departments before Silva was simply hung up on, his letters ignored without reply, and his in-person visits resulted in his removal from the grounds by St. Mary's hospital

Mr. Silva's complaint was heard more readily by Arkham's police, but given that he had provided his verbal consent for the examination, little could be done for him from a legal standpoint. While Police Deputy Dingby did request a search warrant for St. Mary's morgue, that request was denied by Judge Neville Bradford, who noted, "While morbid, no true crime could be investigated or prosecuted, given that Mr. Silva has provided his consent for the post-mortem examination." When this reporter attempted to contact Judge Bradford regarding this ruling, no response was provided.

Editor's Note: following Ms Klein's investigation, Mr. Silva has been institutionalized at Arkham Asylum, following a grief-driven hysterical episode. While we trust Ms. Klein's investigative acumen, it is the Advertiser's opinion that Mr. Silva's claims are spurious at best and should be viewed with skepticism.

Even as Mr. Silva's hunt for

his missing wife continues, additional investigation revealed that Mabel Silva's body may not have been the only one missing. During our interview, Mr. Silva provided details of another individual in similar circumstances: Mrs. Margaret Findlay, of Dunwich, who had reached out to Silva regarding her son, Aiden. Mrs. Findlay had requested a medical examination following her son's death-Aiden had been admitted to the hospital following a serious, ongoing respiratory infection, but died during a routine procedure. However, Mrs. Findlay claims that Aiden's body was released to neither herself nor their chosen funeral director. To date, hospital administration maintained that Aiden's body was turned over appropriately and buried, thoughany attempts to have Aide '. —Cont'd on page 2

-body exhumed have been rebuffed in no uncertain terms.

After conferring with an additional source (name withheld for anonymity), this reporter finds it credible that at least a dozen corpses have gone missing from St. Mary's Hospital morgue over the course of this year, with little recourse made to grieving families or anyone else with knowledge of the deceased. Why would one steal a corpse, particularly with identities so disparate and unrelated to one another? How many more are missing?

Armed with this knowledge, the Advertiser contacted St. Mary's administration staff. though after several hours of being rebuffed, this reporter elected to change tactics. We

instead tracked down Hospital Mortician Ruth Turner, whom this reporter found in mid-examination of a John Doe whose body had recently been recovered during a dredging operation in the River Docks. While this reporter did her best to remain cordial and professional, Ms. Turner's behavior caused this reporter to leave rather than risk an escalating confrontation. In the scant conversation this reporter held with Ms. Turner, the mortician did claim that she had no knowledge of any missing corpses, nor would she be able to answer any further questions.

While this reporter has yet to uncover further information on these missing cadavers, the Arkham Advertiser remains a steadfast ally to all those af-



-a pep rally and bonfire outside of the university stadium. Alumni events began the next day with distinguished alums attending courses, visiting with professors and staff, and enjoying a nostalgic meal in the dining hall with University President Dr. James Erwin. Erwin spoke to the assembled body in joyous tones, extolling the "brilliance and diligence" of Miskatonic's graduates, exhorting them to ensure that future generations will have their chance to bear witness to the true Miskatonic experience."

Saturday's homecoming festivities began with the traditional lighting of the Torch Knowledge-a brazier that continually in front of Miskatonic's Hoyt Hall throughout the celebrations. Following the lighting ceremony, attendees were escorted to a tent erected just outside of Miskatonic's stadium, where they could enjoy a complimentary breakfast before watching Miskatonic's athletes take to the field. Morning began with both men's and women's field hockey, followed by football. Late afternoon also introduced rugby and track and field matches, with alumni cheering on their younger compatriots.

Saturday came to a close with Miskatonic's annual Homecoming Ball, hosted this year by the Alpha Qoppa Alpha fraternity. Students danced the night away with entertain-ment provided by Ms. Marie Lambeau and her five piece orchestra, lately of Uptown's Nightingale Club. -gem and mineral wing using portable ladders, then cut the very glass from the windows to gain entrance." Notably, only the Condé Diamond was taken-numerous other gems were left unmolested in their displays, leading police to believe that this was a targeted, purposeful theft.

Originally found and carved in India in 1643, the Condé Diamond was gifted to King Louis XIII, who later awarded it to Louis de Bourbon. the Prince of Condé, for his service as Army Commander during the Thirty Years War. Taking on the Condé name, the diamond remained in the Condé family for decades, before being moved to the Muse de Condé in Chantilly, where it became part of its typical display. The diamond's pink coloration comes from a deformation in the stone's crystalline structure, with pink diamonds accounting for less than 1% of all cut stones worldwide. The Condé Diamond, particularly, garnered fame for its unique combination of its rare hue, its expertly designed cut, and its sheer size.

The Condé Diamond does, however, have a special place in Arkham's history, as it briefly served as part of Miskatonic University's "Gems of the World" temporary exhibit

five years ago. Security concerns were particularly high during this exhibit, as a streak of break-ins at Miskatonic Museum were in full swing. At the time, Museum Director Ellen Colcomb commented that "we have all faith" in campus security and policing. When asked for comment on the recent theft and ongoing investigation, Colcomb decried the crime as, "An absolute shame. People across the world should have the opportunity to see such an exquisitely cut gem such as the Condé." To date, no culprit has been apprehended for the Miskatonic Museum breakins, though Arkham Police remain confident that the perpetrator will be brought to instice.

Investigation into the Condé theft remains ongoing, with the International Criminal Police Commission helping coordinate efforts between law enforcement in Europe. While some citizens have questioned the role of an international police force that transcends borders, French authorities maintain that the gem must be returned posthaste. While it remains unlikely that the gem could have reached American shores, any individual with information relating to the diamond theft should contact the French Consulate in Boston.

GRIEVING WIDOW CAUSES DISTURBANCE AT ARKH ADVERTISER DOUA

CANDIDATES PREPARE FOR FINAL ALDERMAN DEBATE

As Election Day draws nearer, candidates for Arkham's two open alderman seats will have one final chance to appeal to voters. The final debate for this highly contested race is slated to be held mid-October at Arkham's storied Bayfriar Gardens. The debate provides voters with their chance to question candidates on their platform and gives candidates the opportunity to challenge one another on both policy and fitness for the upcoming term.

To date, the three-way race has become particularly vicious, as each candidate provides a different view of Arkham's future. Candidates have taken great pains to heatedly debate policy matters and deliver personal affronts, leading to one of the most memorable election cycles in recent history.

Currently leading the race, with an estimated 36% of registered voters, is Matthew Anderson White, a current incumbent for one of the open alderman seats. First elected six years ago Mr. White has served faithfully on Arkham's council of aldermen, following a storied career in shipping

and logistics in Boston, Innsmouth, and Portland. Mr. White's voting record has been cast into question, as he has voted numerous times to decrease funding for Arkham's police department and ease local Prohibition regulations.-Cont'd on page 2

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Staff Assaulted Conspiracy Slur

Following a shocking display of grief, newly widowed Lita Chantler was arrested and held on charges of disturbing the peace after causing an incident outside the offices of the Arkham Advertiser.

Chantler arrived at the Uptown building shouting obscenities toward staff and other individuals, claiming they had played a role in her husband's recent demise. Mrs. Chantler made her way into the Advertiser's headquarters, pushing past the security guard and several staff members. She proceeded to throw office items at the walls and at Advertiser staffers. While Chantler maintained this barrage, Advertiser staff swiftly called Arkham police. While waiting for the deputies, Mrs. Chantler was subdued by three print-house workers, who arrived having heard the

commotion. They corralled and restrained Mrs. Chantler until Arkham police arrived on the scene.

Mrs. Chantler continued to cast aspersions on the Advertiser's staff, insinuating an ongoing relationship to an unknown organization that she claimed had infiltrated Arkham's society. The Advertiser strongly denies these accusations, particularly noting Mrs. Chantler's lack of evidence and her state of mind. The Arkham Advertiser prides itself on the importance of its journalistic integrity within the greater Miskatonic community.

Police placed Mrs. Chantler under arrest with charges of disturbing the peace, vandalism, and attempted battery. Mrs. Chantler complied and went peaceably, but not quietly. The widow was held in city jail, pending her release on \$35 bail. A hearing has been set for Mrs. Chantler's charges with the Arkham magistrate's office.

Based solely upon her ravings throughout the encounter, Mrs. Chantler also believes that the Arkham Advertiser has been withholding information regarding the unfortunate death of her late husband, John Chantler. Mr. Chantler's death was ruled a tragic accident, and his funeral was a well-attended, somber affair held at Arkham's Duterte Funeral Home.

Advertiser reporters did attempt to question Mrs. Chantler during her brief incarceration, but Mrs. Chantler has been advised by her lawyer to refrain from commenting on the ongoing legal case. Arkham Deputy Dingby, however, did provide commentary, "Freedom of the press is one of our real, important rights. As police, it's our job to defend that. She may not like it, but Mrs. Chantler's actions were real inappropriate. She'll have her day in court to tell her side, but you can't just walk into a business and start throwing a fit like that." - Cont'd on page 2

-Opponents have painted White as "soft on crime," insinuating him to be a drunkard or even as a bootlegger, due to a supposed association with the Sheldon family.

Following Mr. White with an estimated 35% of registered voters is Reginald Boynton. A native of Kingsport and heir to the Boynton-Kingsport Shipbuilding Company, Boynton made a failed bid for Arkham's mayorship, losing by double-digits to current mayor Charlie Kane. Boynton has taken a more aggressive approach to this election in comparison. Boynton's stump speeches to Arkhamites have had all the subtlety of an inflamed minister, preaching fire and brimstone should Arkham continue its current course. His opponents, naturally, have portrayed Boynton as a doomsayer, unwilling to admit Arkham's continued economic and cultural suc-

First-time candidate Sarah Howells has managed to garner the rest of registered voters with a slim margin of voters still undecided. Howells, a former attorney and law clerk in Burlington, returned to her hometown of Arkham with a stated intent to "bring the golden age from the cities to Arkham." Howells has been quick to establish working partnerships with Miskatonic

University, the Arkham Historical Society, and the Silver Twilight Lodge, in developing new plans for city infrastructure and educational opportunities. However, Howells' opponents have attacked her as being out of touch with Arkham's current challenges, portraying her as an outsider and carpetbagger, seizing on political opportunity to further her own career. -from the nearby McGill College: Mr. Jacques Price, Mr. Samuel Smilovitz, and Mr. Jocelyn Gordon Whitehead. Mr. Houdini had been known to invite fans and students to speak with him after shows. Arkham's own Alden Oakes and his friends were also privileged with a private audience with Mr. Houdini at a prior performance. After conversing with the trio, however, Whitehead struck Houdini in the stomach and abdomen repeatedly. Smilovitze claimed that he and Price pulled Whitehead off Houdini, but not before Whitehead landed several "hammer-like blows".

After his assault had been stopped, Whitehead relented and waited patiently as Montreal police arrived on scene to help the afflicted performer. Whitehead was then arrested for assault and battery and is currently being held without bail. Price and Smilovitz recalled their schoolmate having had a fit of religious zealotry, claiming that Whitehead questioned Houdini as to whether he "believed in the miracles of the Bible." Neither Smilovitz nor Price had known Mr. Whitehead to be particularly taken with religion, and Whitehead's actions certainly caught the pair off-guard.

Ever the consummate profes-

sional, Mr. Houdini provided his statement to police, claiming to have "something of a stomach-ache" following the assault incident. The magician planned to sleep off the pain and then proceeded with his scheduled performance at the Princess. Houdini performed a variety of his most notable escapes, including a suspended escape from a straight-jacket and an oversized milk-can filled with water. Houdini also regaled audience members with tales of his experiences as an aviator and his time debunking so-called "spiritualists" by attending seances and other occult gatherings.

In addition to his illustrious career, Mr. Houdini has starred in several movies, including "The Grim Game" and "Terror Island" from the Lasky Corporation and "The Man from Beyond" and "Haldane of the Secret Service" from his own production studio, Houdini Picture Corporation. Rumors swirl of another film in Houdini's slate, though the escape artist has made no official statement on an upcoming moving picture.

Mr. Houdini's stint at the. Princess Theater comes as a' part of a fifteen-city tour, starting in Boston earlier this April and ending in San Francisco before Christmas. Tickets are still on sale for Mr. Houdini's performances, available at your local box offices.

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
